6261 MINISTRY COMMUNITIES

6 congregations 2 full-time pastors 6 lay ministers 1 fulltime deacon



By 2028, we hope to have **128 interconnected congregations**, formed across **28 unique 6261 Ministry Communities** who are rooted in Scripture and worship, and embody Jesus Christ through active engagement with their neighbors and loving service that addresses the needs of their community.

What is a 6261 Ministry Community?

The goal is that each 6261 Ministry Community will be bound together in common life, ministry, and mission. For many, this is a cultural, paradigm shift. Leaders work in copartnership with one another and across the 6 congregations for the purpose of deeply rooted, shared ministry within the community.

Whether you are a congregation interested in learning more or joining a 6261 Ministry Community, a pastor or deacon discerning a call to a 6261 Ministry Community, or a lay inister sensing a vocation to serve in a 6261 Ministry Community—this is the place to start!

6261 Ministry Projects

Each 621 Ministry Community will be formed around a **primary ministry project**. This might look like <u>healing the hurts</u> by addressing issues of poverty, mental health, food insecurity, affordable housing, or racial inequities. It might mean <u>engaging the stranger</u> by focusing on truly welcoming young people and people of color. It might involve <u>loving the land</u> by working on green initiatives, reducing our waste as congregational institutions and as individuals, or by connecting our rural communities with more creation-friendly methods of farming. Whatever the passion and contextual need, a 6261 Ministry Community can commit to this profound work for the sake of the Gospel and one another.

6261 Ministry Communities promote vitality for all 6 of its congregations by providing:

A collective pool of resources to support full-time pastors and deacons, in a time of clergy shortage and in a way that supports clergy health, as well as additional staff such as musicians, Christian education, administration, and more.

- A training structure for lay ministers and inters, allowing for a natural flow of trained leadership some of whom may discern a call to public, rostered ministry.
- A means for staff and members to practice teamwork in a familiar network as they will have to rely on one another to fully support and sustain ministry.
- Built-in support for re-identifying values, mission and community in the wake of Covid-19 and in ever-changing landscape.
- A deeper and broader training and accountability structure for councils, officers, committees, staff, rostered ministers, and lay ministers.
- Greater oversight to guard against financial malfeasance.
- Insight into the Church universal as congregations partner together for the sake of the Gospel, reaching beyond their individual doors and into the broader community.
- Increased opportunities for worship, Bible study, small groups, service, fellowship and other faith practices.
